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There are many free tutorials available online that you can use to learn the basics of using Photoshop. In addition to using the tools shown in the preceding list,

Photoshoppers also use some other tools to create special effects or manipulate images. Chapter 11 provides information on some of the other tools that are helpful for a great deal of image manipulation and retouching. The rest of this chapter discusses the basics of using Photoshop as a basic tool for image editing. Although you may need to use other tools to create professional-looking images, Photoshop is the standard — and certainly the most widely used — tool. Understanding

Photoshop's Layers Like most applications today, Photoshop offers the ability to manipulate images with layers, which are seen as the fundamental building blocks of an image. Layers are on top of the other layers, in order of how they're positioned on the canvas, and layers may be translucent and invisible or opaque and visible. You can move, resize, and rotate the layers, and you can create special effects that you apply only to certain layers. Layers are the base for almost all of Photoshop's features. You can add text, shapes, selections, and other features only on a layer. For example, you can use a text layer to apply a type style to text and a layer mask to define the area that the type appears on, such as the text's borders and background.

You can even create a snapshot of a layer and create the background color in another layer. This feature enables you to edit the properties of a layer, such as a

gradient or perspective warp, and apply that change to the layer. This type of change has special effects only on the layer; you can't see these effects in the layer list or on the original file. Figure 10-1 illustrates a layered image. Illustration by Wiley, Composition Services Graphics **Figure 10-1:** Most images have many layers. Exposing Layers When you create a new file and start working on an image, the default layer is on top. You can see that layer on the layer palette, as shown in Figure 10-1. As you create layers and work with the layers, you can flip back and forth between the original and the layers using the Layer palette at the bottom of the workspace. Keep in mind, however, that you can edit, move, resize, and rotate only the active layer (the one on top of the others).

Choose Deselect or use the keyboard shortcut Ctrl + D on macOS or Linux to deselect objects. Use Ctrl + D to select objects, or choose Select > Deselect Objects. Image Channels The basic color channels contain the information that tells your computer to make your pictures of a certain color. This information is contained in the channels and is there to help you create more vibrant images. In Photoshop, you can edit each channel individually. If you use this keyboard shortcut, it will select the RGB channel you're currently working on. Use the keyboard shortcut Alt + Alt + 0 to select the Red channel. You can also use the keyboard shortcut Cmd + Tab to select all channels if you wish to edit them in one go. Image Sharpening If you don't sharpen your images (technically called dark-adaptation), you'll end up with washed-out pictures that don't look right. Image sharpening is a type of adjusting that takes the picture to improve its appearance, especially when using film or when using a camera on low settings. In Photoshop, you have to manually sharpen images. You can also create sharpening presets in Photoshop. I use the Keyboard shortcut Ctrl + I to sharpen images and the keyboard shortcut Ctrl + U to unsharpen images. Image Adjustments The basic image adjustments are available in Photoshop and are available in Photoshop Elements as well. I use Ctrl + I to apply image adjustments, Ctrl + U to un-apply them and shift + Ctrl + I to show the dialog box for the adjustment. Image
